Families with more than one child at the boarding school receive a reduced boarding fee. The discount starts when another child enrolls and continues until a child leaves the school. Children are counted as siblings if they share a last name or are officially registered at the same address.

Boarding fee reductions are applied as follows:

Application fee

A boarding application fee of SEK 5 000 is payable at the time the application is sent. The fee is non-refundable.

Starter kit

A fee of SEK 10 000 will be added to the first invoice, together with the boarding fee. The registration fee covers start-up costs for school uniforms and other items. The fee is non-refundable.

Invoicing

School fees are invoiced twice per academic year. Payment for the autumn term should be received by Sigtunaskolan Humanistiska Läroverket by 30 June and for the spring term by 30 November.

Half of the yearly school fee will be charged with the respective invoicing. Overdue payments will be subject to penalty interest charges. If a payment is not made, collection procedures will be pursued on behalf of SSHL by the debt collection agency Intrum.

IB examination fee

The examination fee paid by the school to the International Baccalaureate Organization (IBO) for each Year 3 student will be invoiced to the student's guardian.

Expatriate Swedish citizen

In order for a student to be regarded as a Swedish expatriate, the following conditions must be met:

1. The student's parents/guardian must permanently reside overseas:
 - permanent residence constitutes a continuous time period of six months or more
 - parents/guardians shall take their overnight rest overseas
 - temporary interruption to overseas residence is irrelevant to the assessment.
2. At least one parent/guardian must be a Swedish citizen.
3. The student must not be registered (folkbokförd) in Sweden.

Personal expenses

Parents/guardians or students themselves are responsible for personal expenses or expenditures in school, which are not included in the school fees.

Other expenses

Expenses for the following activities/eventualities will be debited to parents/guardians:

- participation in some courses and activities organized by the extracurricular department that are not included in the school fee
- emergency visits to a doctor and ensuing expenses
- damage caused by the student to school property
- false fire alarms
- lost course literature
- lost key or key tag



Study allowance through the Swedish Board of Student Finance (CSN)

Government study aid is provided in the form of a study grant and an accommodation allowance. Application forms and further information are available at www.csn.se.

Allowances for middle school students

Child allowances are paid up to and including the quarter when students reach their 16th birthday.

Extended child allowances are paid from the quarter after the students have reached their 16th birthday. Extended child allowance is paid up to and including the time a student completes their middle school studies. The child allowance is paid out every month by The Swedish Social Insurance Agency (Försäkringskassan). Students who are Swedish citizens and have a parent/guardian who resides in Sweden are eligible to receive child allowance.

Boarder's contract

Once a student has been formally admitted to the school by the SSHL Admissions Board, a boarders' contract is drawn up between the school and the student's parent(s)/guardian to be signed.

Municipal registration

Students from Sweden who live abroad should not be registered in the Swedish population register according to the Swedish National Agency for Education, and the rules on population registration for stays longer than 12 months do not apply to those who began their studies before turning 18 and will complete them before their 21st birthday.

You should remain registered at your parents' address if you are under 18 years old and, due to your studies, must live in a different residence than your parents. This applies as long as you continue your studies in compulsory school, upper-secondary school, or an equivalent education that you began before turning 18. However, this applies only up until your 21st birthday.
